June 2013 National Meeting Recap

In June, several board members including President Kristen Knox, Vice President Emily Pearce, Treasurer Quinlan Lee, and National VP Carin Siegfried travelled to Nashville, TN to attend the annual Women's National Book Association annual meeting.

At the meeting, the following topics were addressed:

- 1. Preplanning for the WNBA's 100^{th} anniversary, which is in 2017
- 2. Overall finances of the WNBA and individual chapters, which resulted in a small increase in membership dues for the forthcoming year. (More information on annual membership follows.)
- 3. Planning for annual events, such as the Pannell Award (which recognizes the work of booksellers who stimulate, promote and encourage children's and young people's interest in books), the Eastman Grant (a \$500 award to a library association) and the 2nd annual writing contest.
- 4. Discussion of how to encourage and perpetuate leadership on the Board-level within individual chapters

Traveling to the National Meeting gave us some great ideas specifically for our Charlotte membership. We plan on expanding benefits to our members via members only gatherings and by offering better visibility for members' new publications. We also heard some good ideas on how to make the administrative end of things run smoother and how to plan for the future. We continued to discuss how to balance programs to benefit both readers and writers, something I think we already do pretty well here in Charlotte. And we started to think about how we as a chapter will celebrate the 100th anniversary of the organization.

Industry News



As reported by *The Telegraph* (UK), singer Kelly Clarkson purchased a ring at auction known to be worn by Jane Austen, but she wasn't allowed to take it out of England. Following her £150,000 bid, Ed Vaizey, the British Minister of Culture, put a temporary export bar on the ring in an attempt to keep it in Britain. The ring is one of only three surviving pieces of jewelry known to have belonged to the author of *Pride and Prejudice*, having been given to her sister Cassandra and then passed down through the family before it was sold.

Mr Vaizey said: "Jane Austen's modest lifestyle and her early death mean that objects associated with her of any kind are extremely rare, so I hope that a UK buyer comes forward so this simple but elegant ring can be saved for the nation." The decision on the export license will be deferred until September 30 and can be extended to December 30 if proof emerges of "a serious intention to raise funds" to match its six-figure price tag. Basically, if someone English can purchase the ring and keep it in the country, it will go to them instead, provided they agreed to offer it for public display at least 100 days of the year. Clarkson is said to be a huge fan of Austen. When she was barred from taking the ring from the country, her fiancé bought her a replica, which she has been pictured wearing in the US.

Visitation Street

Ivy Pochoda (Ecco/Dennis Lehane)

Exquisitely written, Pochoda's poignant second novel examines how residents of Brooklyn's Red Hook neighborhood deal with grief, urban development, loss, and teenage angst. In a fit of boredom, 15-year-old best friends Val Marino and June Giatto take a raft out on the bay one July evening, but only Val returns, her unconscious body washed up on the shore. June's disappearance and what might have happened on the raft become the linchpin for Fadi, a Lebanese native who wants his bodega to be the pulse of neighborhood news; Jonathan Sprouse, a Julliard dropout with dark secrets; and 18-year-old Cree James, a kid from the projects who longs for a better life but remains stymied by his father's murder. Pochoda (The Art of Disappearing) couples a raw-edged, lyrical look at characters' innermost fears with an evocative view of Red Hook, a traditionally working-class area of Brooklyn undergoing gentrification that still struggles with racism and the aftermath of drug violence. By the end, the gap between "the front" of Red Hook with its well-tended streets near the waterfront and "the back" with its housing projects remains wide. Agent: Kim Witherspoon at Inkwell Management. (July)

Ghost Moth

Michèle Forbes (Bellevue Literary Press)

This amazingly assured first novel is set in Northern Ireland from 1949 to 1986, and is about lost love and the limited consolations of family. After receiving rejections from 38 publishers in the U.K. and Ireland, Forbes (an actress) got a tip from Paul Harding of Tinkers fame at the Dublin Writers' Festival, which led her to send the manuscript to Bellevue.

Burial

Claire Donato (Tarpaulin Sky)

Donato's hallucinatory meditation on grief seems like a strange summer read, but her poetic, trance-inducing language turns a reckoning with the confusion of mortality into readerly joy at the sensuality of living. Also, it's small and fits in most pockets, so you can bring it pretty much everywhere, which I plan on doing and highly recommend.

Red Sparrow

Jason Matthews (Scribner)

The freelancer who reviewed this debut spy thriller for PW thought it was the best in the genre he'd read in a long time. The author, a retired CIA officer, told some great stories about his 33 years in the agency at the lunch his publisher hosted for him recently in New York. Each chapter concludes with a recipe for a dish consumed in the text.

WNBA and the U.S. Fund for UNICEF

Did you know that the Women's National Book Association (national) has a special on-going partnership with the **U.S. Fund for UNICEF?** This partnership was conceived and developed in 2004 under the auspices of the U.S. Fund for UNICEF (NGO Section). The Association's role ranges from emergency-relief donations, to UNICEF USA campaign-awareness to literacy advocacy for women and girls (**UNICEF's Afghanistan Education Alliance**).

Malala Yousafzai celebrates her birthday and education for all at the United Nations

Pakistani education activist and violence survivor Malala Yousafzai marked her 16th birthday on July 12, 2013, at United Nations headquarters by giving her first high-level public appearance and statement on the importance of education. Malala became a public figure when she was shot by the Taliban while travelling to school last year in Pakistan – targeted because of her committed campaigning for the right of all girls to an education. Her birthday was declared as "Malala Day" and was observed internationally for the first time on this date.

The President of the General Assembly and the UN Special Envoy for Global Education, with the support of the non-profit organization A World at School, are organizing the UN Youth Assembly, where more than 500 young leaders from around the world will convene to accelerate efforts to get all children, especially girls, in school by 2015. The event is in support of the UN Secretary-General's Global Education First Initiative (GEFI)—a five-year global initiative to mobilize efforts and action for education and rally a global movement to achieve quality, relevant and inclusive education for all by 2015.



Quiet: The Power of Introverts in a World That Won't Stop Talking by Susan Cain



While at the WNBA national board meeting in Nashville, I bought Quiet in the bookstore co-owned by Ann Patchett, award-winning novelist and winner of the 2013 WNBA Award. She told me Quiet is the unofficial theme book of Parnassus Books, which she described as "owned by two introverts, staffed with introverts, who sell products created by introverts to introverts."

Armed with loads of research, author Susan Cain makes the argument that, in a culture where extroversion is celebrated and idealized, quiet people have a unique skill set that is much in need. Though the research details at times get tedious, as a whole, I found the book enlightening and empowering.

According to Cain, introverts often have to develop extrovert skills (like public speaking) to make their way through life. If they have more self-awareness of their own assets and needs, though, introverts can adapt more easily to their environment and find arenas where their skills shine. If you're an introvert, or have a loved one who is (and let's face it, there are a lot of us), Quiet is well worth reading.
